What does 'Islam' mean?

The Arabic word 'Islam' simply means 'submission', and derives from a word meaning 'peace'.

In a religious context it means complete submission to the will of God.

For a fifth of the world's population, Islam is both a religion and a complete way of life. Muslims follow a religion of peace, mercy, and forgiveness, and the vast majority have nothing to do with the extremely grave events which have come to be associated with their faith.


Who are the Muslims?

More than One billion and a half people from a vast range of races, nationalities and cultures across the globe --from the southern Philippines to Nigeria -- are united by their common Islamic faith. About 18% live in the Arab world.

The world's largest Muslim community today .. is in Indonesia (soon to be surpassed by India);

Substantial parts of Asia and most of Africa are Muslim, while significant minorities are to be found in the Soviet Union, China, North and South America, Australia, and Europe.

What do Muslims believe in?



Muslims believe in One, Unique, Incomparable God; in the Angels created by Him; in the prophets through whom His revelations were brought to mankind; in the Day of Judgement and individual accountability for actions; as well as in God's complete authority over human destiny and in life after death.

Muslims believe in a chain of prophets starting with Adam and including Noah, Abraham, Ishmael, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Job, Moses, Aaron, David, Solomon, Elias, Jonah, John the Baptist, and Jesus, peace be upon them. But God's last message to man, a reconfirmation of the eternal message and a summing-up of all that has gone before was revealed to the Prophet Muhammad through Gabriel.

How does someone become a Muslim?



Simply by saying: 'I declare that there is no god apart from God, and declare that Muhammad is the Messenger of God. By this declaration the believer announces his or her faith in all God's messengers, and the scriptures they brought.

WILFRIED HOFMANN (NOW MURAD HOFFMANN):

Ph.D. in law (Harvard); German social scientist and diplomat; He embraced Islam in 1980.

"For some time now, striving for more and more precision and brevity, I have tried to put on paper in a systematic way, all philosophical truths, which in my view, can be ascertained beyond reasonable doubt. What does Islam mean?



The Arabic word 'Islam' simply means 'submission', and derives from a word meaning 'peace'. In a religious context it means complete submission to the will of God. 'Mohammedanism' is thus a misnomer because it suggests that Muslims worship Muhammad rather than God. 'Allah' is the Arabic name for God, which is used by the Arabs. Muslims, Christians and Jews alike.

Perhaps this is because religion does not dominate everyday life in the West today, whereas Muslims have religion always uppermost in their minds, and make no division between secular and sacred. Do Islam and Christianity have different origins?




COEXISTENCE

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Muhammad was born in Makkah in the year 570 A.D., at a time when Christianity was not yet fully established in Europe. Since his father died before his birth, and his mother shortly afterwards, he was raised by his uncle from the respected tribe of Quraysh. As he grew up, he became known for his truthfulness, generosity and sincerity, so that he was sought after for his ability to arbitrate in disputes. The historians describe him as calm and meditative.

How did Muhammad become a prophet and a messenger of God?



At the age of 40, while engaged in a meditative retreat, Muhammad received his first revelation from God through the Angel Gabriel. This revelation, which continued for twenty-three years, is known as the Quran.

As soon as he began to recite the words he heard from Gabriel, and to preach the truth which God had revealed to him, he and his small group of followers suffered bitter persecution, which grew so fierce that in the year 622 A.D. God gave them the command to emigrate.

This event, the 'Hijra', (migration), in which they left Makkah for the city of Madinah some 260 miles to the north, marks the beginning of the Muslim calendar. After several years, the Prophet and his followers were able to return to Makkah, where they forgave their enemies and established Islam definitively. Before the Prophet died at the age of 63, the greater part of Arabia was Muslim, and within a century of his death Islam had spread to Spain in the West and as far as China in the East.

How did the spread of Islam affect the world?




Among the reasons for the rapid and peaceful spread of Islam was the simplicity of its doctrine -- Islam calls for faith in only One God worthy of worship. It also repeatedly instructs man to use his powers of intelligence and observation. Within a few years, great civilizations and universities were flourishing, for according to the Prophet, 'seeking knowledge is an obligation for every Muslim man and woman'.

The synthesis of Eastern and Western ideas and of new thought with old, brought about great advances in medicine, mathematics, physics, astronomy, geography, architecture, art, literature, and history.

Many crucial systems such as algebra, the Arabic numerals, and also the concept of the zero (vital to the advancement of mathematics), were transmitted to medieval Europe from Islam. Sophisticated instruments which were to make possible the European voyages of discovery were developed, including the astrolabe, the quadrant and good navigational maps.

What is the Qur`an?



The Quran is a record of the exact words revealed by God through the Angel Gabriel to the Prophet Muhammad.

It was memorized by Muhammad and then dictated to his Companions, and written down by scribes, who cross-checked it during his lifetime.



This opening chapter of The Quran, the 'Fatiha', is central in Islamic prayer. It contains the essence of The Quran and is recited daily (in each raq'a) during every prayer.

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Radiocarbon dating found the manuscript to be at least 1,370 years old (about 35 years after the first revelation came to Profit Mohammad), making it among the earliest in existence. It was written on sheep or goat skin

..it (*the Quran*) is not a tale invented, but a confirmation of what was sent before it (*i.e., Torah, Gospel and other Scriptures sent by God*) a detailed exposition of all things, and a guide and a mercy for the people who believe (Quran 12:111).

The Quran, the last revealed Word of God, (the Last Testament) is the prime source of every Muslim's faith and practice. It deals with all the subjects which concern us as human beings: wisdom, doctrine, worship, and law, but its basic theme is the relationship between God and His creatures. At the same time it provides guidelines for a just society, proper human conduct and an equitable economic system.

Are there any other sacred sources?

The Prophet Said

All mankind is from Adam and Eve, an Arab has no superiority over a non-Arab nor a non-Arab has any superiority over an Arab; also a white has no superiority over black nor a black has any superiority over white except by piety (taqwa) and good action.



What are the Five Pillars of Islam?



They are the framework of the Muslim life: declaration of faith, prayer, (Zakat) concern for the needy, (Fasting) self-purification, and the pilgrimage to Makkah (for those who are able and could afford to do SO).

There is no god but God, Muhammad is the messenger of God.

There is no god worthy of worship except God and Muhammad is His messenger. This declaration of faith is called the 'Shahada', a simple formula which all the faithful pronounce. In Arabic, the first part is la ilaha illa Llah - 'there is no god except God'; *ilaha* (god) can refer to anything which we may be tempted to put in place of God -- wealth, power, and the like... Then comes illa Llah: 'except God', the source of all Creation.

The second part of the Shahada is *Muhammadun rasulu'Llah*: 'Muhammad is the messenger of God.'

A message of guidance has come through a man like ourselves.

2. PRAYER



'Salat' is the name for the obligatory prayers which are performed five times a day, and are a direct link between the worshipper and God. There is no hierarchical authority in Islam, and no priests, so the prayers are led by a learned person who knows the Quran, chosen by the congregation. These five prayers contain verses from the Quran, and are said in Arabic, the language of the Revelation, but personal supplication can be offered in one's own language. Prayers are said at dawn, noon, mid-afternoon, sunset and nightfall, and thus determine the rhythm of the entire day.

Although it is preferable to worship together in a mosque, a Muslim may pray almost anywhere, such as in fields, offices, factories and universities. Visitors to the Muslim world are struck by the centrality of prayers in daily life.

3. THE 'ZAKAT'



One of the most important principles of Islam is that all things belong to God, and that wealth is therefore held by human beings in trust. The word zakat means both 'purification' and 'growth'. Our possessions are purified by setting aside a proportion for those in need, and, like the pruning of plants, this cutting back balances and encourages new growth. Each Muslim calculates his or her own zakat individually. For most purposes this involves the payment each year of two and a half percent of one's (idle) capital.

A pious person may also give as much as he or she pleases as 'sadaqa', and does so preferably in secret. Although this word can be translated as 'voluntary charity' it has a wider meaning. The Prophet said 'even meeting your brother with a cheerful face is charity.'

The Prophet said: 'Charity is a necessity for every Muslim. He was asked: 'What if a person has nothing?' The Prophet replied: 'He should work with his own hands for his benefit and then give something out of such earnings in charity." The Companions asked: 'What if he is not able to work?'The Prophet said: 'He should help poor and needy persons. 'The Companions further asked 'What if he cannot do even that?' The Prophet said: He should urge others to do good. 'The Companions said 'What if he lacks that also?' The Prophet said: 'He should check himself from doing evil. That is also charity.





Every year in the month of Ramadan; all Muslims fast from first light until sundown, abstaining from food, drink, and sexual relations. Those who are sick, elderly, or on a journey, and women who are pregnant or nursing are permitted to break the fast and make up an equal number of days later in the year. If they are physically unable to do this, they must feed a needy person for every day missed. Children begin to fast (and to observe the prayer) from puberty, although many start earlier.

Although the fast is most beneficial to the health, it is regarded principally as a method of self-purification. By cutting oneself off from worldly comforts, even for a short time, a fasting person gains true sympathy with those who go hungry, as well as growth in one's spiritual life.

5. PILGRIMAGE (Hajj)



The annual pilgrimage to Makkah - the 'Hajj' - is an obligation only for those who are physically and financially able to perform it. Nevertheless, more than two million people go to Makkah each year from every corner of the globe, providing a unique opportunity for those of different nations to meet one another. Although Makkah is always filled with visitors, the annual Hajj begins in the twelfth month of the Islamic year (which is lunar, not solar, so that Hajj and Ramadan fall sometimes in summer, sometimes in winter). Pilgrims wear special clothes: simple garments which strip away distinctions of class and culture, so that all stand equal before God.



The rites of the Hajj, which are of Abrahamic origin, include circling the Ka'ba seven times, and going seven times between the mountains of Safa and Marwa as did Hagar during her search for water. Then the pilgrims stand together on the wide plain of Arafa and join in prayers for God's forgiveness, in what is often thought of as a preview of the Last Judgment. In previous centuries the Hajj was an arduous undertaking. Today, however, Saudi Arabia provides millions of people with water, modern transport, and the most up-to-date health facilities.

CASSIUS CLAY (NOW MUHAMMAD ALI):

American; three times World Heavyweight Champion, formerly a Christian. He embraced Islam in 1965.

"I have had many nice moments in my life. But the feelings I had while standing on Mount Arafat on the day of Hajj (Muslims' pilgrimage), was the most unique. I felt exalted by the indescribable spiritual atmosphere there as over a million and a half pilgrims invoked God to forgive them of their sins and bestow on them His choicest blessings. It was an exhilarating experience to see to people belonging to different colors, races and nationalities, kings, heads of states and ordinary men from very poor countries all clad in two simple white sheets praying to God without any sense of either pride or inferiority. It was a practical manifestation of the concept of equality in Islam."

The close of the Hajj is marked by a festival, the Eid al-Adha, which is celebrated with prayers and the exchange of gifts in Muslim communities everywhere. This, and the Eid al-Fitr, a feast-day commemorating the end of Ramadan, are the main festivals of the Muslim calendar.

Are Good Deeds Important in Islam?

Doing good deeds and having the right belief go hand in hand in Islam. In fact, doing good deeds in practice is the proof of having the right belief in the heart. This is why the Holy Quran speaks of true Muslims very often as "those who believe and do good deeds".

Following are few examples:

* If any do good deeds, be they male or female and have faith, they will enter heaven (paradise), and not the least injustice will be done to them. (Quran 4:124) * [He sent] a Messenger [Muhammad] reciting to you the distinct verses of God that He may bring out those who believe and do good deeds from darkness into light. And whoever believes in God and does good deeds - He will admit him into gardens beneath which rivers flow to abide therein forever. God will have perfected for him a provision. (Quran 65:11)

* Those who believe and do good deeds, we shall soon admit them to gardens, with rivers flowing beneath, to dwell therein for ever. God's promise is the truth, and whose word can be truer than God's? (Quran 4:122)

* Indeed, God will admit those who believe and do righteous deeds to gardens beneath which rivers flow. They will be adorned therein with bracelets of gold and pearl, and their garments therein will be silk. (Quran 22:23)

Examples of Good Deeds in Islam

Truthful

Apart from the Prayers, Zakat (Charity) and fasting, Good deeds in Islam will include:1. Justice

God commands you to render back your Trusts to those to whom they are due; and when you judge between people, that you judge with justice: verily how excellent is the teaching which He gives you (Quran 4:58)

2. Truthfulness

"Be maintainers of justice and bearers of true witness for God, even if it (the truth) goes against your own selves or parents or relatives or someone who is rich or poor." (Quran 4:135)

3. Sincerity

"It is most hateful in the sight of God that you say things which you do not do." (Quran 61:3)

4. Unselfishness

"You cannot attain to righteousness unless you spend (in charity) out of those things which you love." (Quran 3:92)

5. Humility

"The servants of the Beneficent (God) are those who walk on the earth in humility." (Quran 25:63)





6. Patience

"You who have believed, seek help through patience and prayers. Indeed God is with the patients. (Quran 2:153) "Give good news to the patients, who, when a misfortune befalls them, say: Truly to God we belong and to Him we shall return." (Quran 2:155-156)

7. Forgiveness

"Pardon (people) and overlook (their faults). Don't you love that God should forgive you." (Quran 24:22) "(The dutiful are) . . . those who restrain their anger and pardon people. God loves those who do good to others." (Quran 3:134)

FORGIVENESS

8. Honesty

"Don't go near the property of an orphan, except in a goodly way, till he attains maturity. And fulfill the promise (you make) Give full measure when you measure out, and weigh with a true balance." (Quran 17:34-35)

9. Goodness and kindness to others "Do good to others, surely God loves those who do good to others." (Quran 2:195) God commands justice, the doing of good



to others, and liberality to kith and kin, and he forbids all shameful deeds, and injustice and rebellion. (Quran 16:90) **10. Moderation**

Those who, when they spend, are not extravagant and not niggardly, but hold a just (balance) between those (extremes). (Quran 25:67)

What Qualities should Muslims acquire?

"The truthful men and the truthful women, the patient men and the patient women, the humble men and the humble women, the charitable men and the charitable women, the fasting men and the fasting women, the men who guard their chastity and the women who guard their chastity, the men who remember God much and the women who remember God much - for all these God has prepared forgiveness and a great reward." (Quran 33:35)

British; formerly a Christian and a world famous pop singer. He embraced Islam in 1973.

"It will be wrong to judge Islam in the light of the behavior of some bad Muslims who are always shown on the media. It is like judging a car as a bad one if the driver of the car is drunk and he bangs it into the wall. Islam guides all human beings in daily life in it's spiritual, mental and physical dimensions. But we must find the sources of these instruction, the Qur'an and the example of the Prophet. Then we can see the ideal of Islam."

Does Islam Recommend Certain Manners?

1. Putting Trust in God "Certainly, God loves those who put their trust (in Him)." (Quran: 3:159) 2. Perfection of One's Work The Messenger (peace be upon him) said: "God loves that if one does a job he perfects it." **3. Rescuing** The Messenger (puh) said: "God loves rescuing the one who needs rescue."

4. Repentance "Truly, God loves those who turn unto him in repentance." (Quran: 2:222) **5. Body Purification** "And God loves those who make themselves clean and pure." (Quran: 9:108) 6. Belief and Work The Messenger (puh) said: "God loves the servant who believes and acquires a career (or work)." 7. Magnanimity The Messenger (puh) said: "God is All-Generous and He loves generosity in sale, purchase and judgment."

8. Virtuosity

The Messenger (puh) said: "God loves the servant-believer who is poor but virtuous enough to refrain from begging though he has many children."

9. Strength

The Messenger (puh) said: "The strong believer is better and more loved by God than the weak one, but they are both good." **10. Good Manners and Conduct**

The Messenger (puh) said: "The best loved by me and the nearest to me on the Day of Resurrection are those who have the best manners and conduct amongst you, who are intimate, are on good terms with others and are humble, and the most furthest from me are those who are talkative and arrogant."

Does Islam tolerate other beliefs?

There is no compulsion in religion. Verily the Right Path has become distinct from the wrong path. Whoever rejects evil and believes in God has grasped the most trustworthy handhold that never breaks. And God is All-Hearer, All-Knower (Quran 2:256).

o In surah al-Baqarah verse 256 :

لَآ إِكْرَاءَ فِي ٱلدِّينِّ قَدَتَّبَيَّنَ ٱلرُّشْدُمِنَ ٱلْغَيِّ فَمَن يَكْفُرُ بِٱلطَّحْوُتِ وَيُؤْمِنَ بِٱللَّهِ فَقَدِ ٱسْتَمْسَكَ بِٱلْعُرْوَةِ ٱلْوُثْقَىٰ لَا ٱنفِصَامَ لَمَا َّوَٱللَّهُ سَمِيحُ عَلِيمٌ () The Quran says: God forbids you not -- with regards to those who fight you not for [your] faith nor drive you out of your homes -- from dealing kindly and justly with them; for God loveth those who are just. (Quran 60:8)

Islamic law permits non-Muslim minorities to set up their own courts, which implement family laws drawn up by the minorities themselves.

"Muslim Spain was a paradise for the Jews, and there has never been a Jewish Holocaust in the Muslim world. Even pogroms were extremely rare. Muhammad decreed that the 'Peoples of the Book' (Jews and Christians) be treated tolerantly, subject to conditions that were incomparably more liberal than those in contemporary Europe.

"The Muslims never imposed their religion by force on Jews and Christians, as shown by the fact that almost all the Jews expelled from Catholic Spain settled in the Muslim countries and flourished there.

It is also one function of Islamic law to protect the privileged status of minorities, and this is why non-Muslim places of worship have flourished all over the Islamic world. History provides many examples of Muslim tolerance towards other faiths: when the caliph Omar entered Jerusalem in the year 634 A.D., Islam granted freedom of worship to all religious communities in the city. The Patriarch invited him to pray in the Church of the Holy Sepulcher, but he preferred to pray outside its gates, saying that if he accepted, later generations of Muslims might use his action as an excuse to turn it into a mosque.

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Muslims respect and revere Jesus, and await his Second Coming. They consider him one of the greatest of God's messengers to mankind. A Muslim never refers to him simply as 'Jesus', but always adds the phrase 'upon him be peace'. The Quran confirms his virgin birth (a chapter of the Quran is entitled 'Mary'), and Mary is considered the purest woman in all creation.

The Quran describes the Annunciation as follows: 'Behold!' the Angel said, 'God has chosen you, and purified you, and chosen you above the women of all nations. O Mary, God gives you good news of a word from Him, whose name shall be the Messiah, Jesus son of Mary, honored in this world and the Hereafter, and one of those brought near to God. He shall speak to the people from his cradle and in maturity, and shall be of the righteous.'

The peace and security offered by a stable family unit is greatly valued, and seen as essential for the spiritual growth of its members. A harmonious social order is created by the existence of extended families; children are treasured, and rarely leave home until the time they marry.

Islam sees a woman, whether single or married, as an individual in her own right, with the right to own and dispose of her property and earnings. A marriage dowry is given by the groom to the bride for her own personal use, and she keeps her own family name rather than taking her husband's.

'I WAS A SLAVE TO BROKEN SOCIETY'



Lynne Ali: 'This is the real me'

LYNNE ALI admits she was 'a typical white hard-partying teenager'. But her hectic lifestyle left her feeling something was missing.

The 31-year-old former DJ, from Dagenham in Essex, said: 'I would go out and get drunk with friends, wear tight and revealing clothing and date boys.


'I think, underneath it all, I must have been searching for something, and I wasn't feeling fulfilled by my hard-drinking, party lifestyle.'

She met her boyfriend, Zahid, at university, and converted to Islam at the age of 19. She now wears the Islamic scarf, or niqab, when she goes out and describes it as 'liberating'.

'I am so grateful I found my escape route,' she said. 'This is the real me – I am happy to pray five times a day and take classes at the mosque. I am no longer a slave to a broken society and its expectations.'

Both men and women are expected to dress in a way which is modest and dignified; the traditions of female dress found in some Muslim countries are often the expression of local customs. The Messenger of God said: The most perfect in faith amongst believers is he who is best in manner and kindest to his wife."

Can a Muslim have more than one wife?



The religion of Islam was revealed for all societies and all times and so accommodates widely differing social requirements. Circumstances may warrant the taking of another wife but the right is granted, according to the Quran, only on condition that the husband is scrupulously fair.

Is Islamic marriage like Christian marriage?

Love & Marriage in Islam

And among His Signs is that He has created for you mates from among yourselves that ye may dwell in tranquility with them And He has put love and mercy between (your hearts) (The Qur'an. Surah Al Rum :21)

They (Your Wives) are your garments and you are their garments (The Qur'an Surah Al Baqarah:187)

A Muslim marriage is not a 'sacrament', but a simple, legal agreement in which either partner is free to include conditions. Marriage customs thus vary widely from country to country. As a result, divorce is not common, although it is not forbidden as a last resort. According to Islam, no Muslim girl can be forced to marry against her will: her parents will simply suggest young men they think may be suitable.

How do Muslims treat the elderly?




In the Islamic world there are no old people's homes. The strain of caring for one's parents in this most difficult time of their lives is considered an honor and blessing, and an opportunity for great spiritual growth. God asks that we not only pray for our parents, but act with limitless compassion, remembering that when we were helpless children they preferred us to themselves.

Mothers are particularly honored: the Prophet taught that 'Paradise lies at the feet of mothers'. When they reach old age, Muslim parents are treated mercifully, with the same kindness and selflessness. In Islam, serving one's parents is a duty second only to prayer, and it is their right to expect it. It is considered despicable to express any irritation when, through no fault of their own, the old become difficult.

The Quran says: Your Lord has commanded that you worship none but Him, and be kind to parents. If either or both of them reach old age with you, do not say 'uff to them or chide them, but speak to them in terms of honor and kindness. Treat them with humility, and say, 'My Lord! Have mercy on them, for they did care for me when I was little'. (Quran 17:23-24)

How do Muslims view death?



Like Jews and Christians, Muslims believe that the present life is only a trial preparation for the next realm of existence. Basic articles of faith include: the Day of Judgment, resurrection, Heaven and Hell. When a Muslim dies, he or she is washed, usually by a family member, wrapped in a clean white cloth, and buried with a simple prayer preferably the same day.

Muslims consider this one of the final services they can do for their relatives, and an opportunity to remember their own brief existence here on earth. The Prophet taught that three things can continue to help a person even after death; charity which he had given, knowledge which he had taught and prayers on their behalf by a righteous child.

What does Islam say about war?

Terrorism has no place In Islam

"...Whosoever kills an innocent human being, it shall be as if he has killed all mankind, and whosoever saves the life of one, it shall be as if he had saved the life of all mankind..." Qur'an 5:32

Like Christianity, Islam permits fighting in selfdefense, in defense of religion, or on the part of those who have been expelled forcibly from their homes. It lays down strict rules of combat which include prohibitions against harming civilians and against destroying crops, trees and livestock. As Muslims see it, injustice would be triumphant in the world if good men were not prepared to risk their lives in a righteous cause.

The Quran says: Fight in the cause of God against those who fight you, but do not transgress limits. God does not love transgressors. (Quran 2:190)

If they seek peace, then seek you peace. And trust in God for He is the One that heareth and knoweth all things. (Quran 8:61)

War, therefore, is the last resort, and is subject to the rigorous conditions laid down by the sacred law. The term 'jihad' literally means 'struggle', and Muslims believe that there are two kinds of jihad. The other 'jihad' is the inner struggle which everyone wages against egotistic desires, for the sake of attaining inner peace.

What about food?







Although much simpler than the dietary law followed by Jews and the early Christians, the code which Muslims observe forbids the consumption of pig meat or any kind of intoxicating drink. The Prophet taught that 'your body has rights over you' and the consumption of wholesome food and the leading of a healthy lifestyle are seen as religious obligations. The Prophet said: 'Ask God for certainty [of faith] and well-being; for after certainty, no one is given any gift better than health!'

How does Islam guarantee human rights?

Freedom of conscience is laid down by the Quran itself: *'There is no compulsion in religion'.* (Quran 2:256) The life and property of all citizens in an Islamic state are considered sacred whether a person is Muslim or not.

The Muslim World



The Muslim population of the world (2015) is around one and a half billion. 30% of Muslims live in the Indian subcontinent, 20% in Sub-Saharan Africa, 17% in Southeast Asia, 18% in the Arab World, 10% in the old Soviet Union republics and China. Turkey, Iran and Afghanistan comprise 10% of the non-Arab Middle East. Although there are Muslim minorities in almost every area, including Latin America and Australia, they are most numerous in the old Soviet Union republics, India, and central Africa. There are 50 million Muslims in Europe and 10 million in the United States.

Islam in the United States



It is almost impossible to generalize about American Muslims: converts, immigrants, factory workers, doctors; all are making their own contribution to America's future. This complex community is unified by a common faith, underpinned by a countrywide network of more than a thousand mosques.




Muslims were early arrivals in North America. By the eighteenth century there were many thousands of them, working as slaves on plantations. These early communities cut off from their heritage and families, inevitably lost their Islamic identity as time went by. Today many Afro-American Muslims play an important role in the Islamic community.

In 1947 the Washington Islamic Center was founded by the Egyptian government during the term of President Truman, and several other nationwide organizations were set up in the fifties. The same period saw the establishment of other communities whose lives were in many ways modeled after Islam.

The nineteenth century, however, saw the beginnings of an influx of Arab Muslims, most of whom settled in the major industrial centers where they worshipped in hired rooms. The early twentieth century witnessed the arrival of several hundred thousand Muslims from Eastern Europe: the first Albanian mosque was opened in Maine in 1915; others soon followed, and a group of Polish Muslims opened a mosque in Brooklyn in 1928.

Islam in Australia



Islam in Australia is a <u>minority</u> religious affiliation. According to the 2011 census, 476,291 people, or 2.2% of the total Australian population, were <u>Muslims</u>.

This made <u>Islam</u> the fourth largest religious grouping, after all forms of <u>Christianity</u> (61.1%), <u>irreligion</u> (22.9%, and <u>Buddhism</u> (2.5%)

Demographers attribute Muslim community growth trends during the most recent census period to relatively high birth rates, and recent immigration patterns. Adherents of Islam represent the majority of the population in Cocos (Keeling) Islands. Australia's Muslim population is expected to rise to 714,000 by 2030.

The first mosque in Australia was built in 1861 at Marree, South Australia. The Great Mosque of Adelaide was built in 1888 by the descendants of the Afghan cameleers.
